Class History of 1964

The following is one of the best of the class histories sent to us for the 50th Anniversary of the opening of PSH. PSH teachers remembered the Class of 1964 as one of the best. Thanks to Jan Rais Rosche for her submission.

We, 1964 graduates started our senior year in September 1963. That month 4 girls were killed in a Birmingham, AL church at the hand of the KKK. The month before, MLK had delivered his now famous "I have a dream" speech to civil rights marchers in Washington, D.C. John F. Kennedy was our President until that tragic day in November when he was assassinated. Lyndon Johnson became the new President, carrying on JFK's efforts toward improving civil rights. In June 1964 the Civil rights Act was passed. The cold War and Communism was still a major threat to Democracy.

Locally, John Petruska was Parma's Mayor, Mr. Bassett

REMINISCES

I have written a number of articles telling our readers how it was when I attend our only High School in Parma, Ohio in 1928 and 1929. I graduated in the Class of 1929.

Our former President, Tony De-Marco, and our present President, Nancy Fedak, came to Wooster, Ohio to visit me on March 15, 2005. They suggested that I continue writing articles. I decided to call the articles I write "Reminisces" – I hope you will like them.

Parma High School in 1929—76 years ago

When the property was purchased from the Uhnick family to build our New High School, Byers Field was an apple orchard. Carl Uhnick, who graduated with me in 1929 and is now

96 years old, helped to cut many of the apple trees down to make room for the new athletic field. "Byers Field" is named for Carl Byers, a Superintendent of the Parma Schools at that time and a respected educational leader. The "Dinkey" streetcar traveled from Brookpark and Pearl Roads to Bean Road. It required no turntable as each trolley had controls and a trolley mast at each end of the car. All you had to do was to change the controls and the direction of the trolley. The fare was 3 cents from any point on the route. Ridge Road at that time was half brick and half dirt and the trolley track was on the west side of the road.

There were no buildings north of Parma High School on Ridge Road to Bean Road (now Ridgewood Drive), and no buildings on Bean Road all the way to York Road. This was land that formerly was farmland, had been surveyed, and an allotment planned; but because of the depression years, the plans were cancelled. Commercially the area has grown and is now a major shopping area of Greater Cleveland.

was our high school principal and Mr. Briggs, the superintendent of schools. We drove the streets of Parma, then in second hand cars or our parents' Oldsmobiles and Chevrolets to Parmatown, Brookpark Bowling, Putt-Putt, State Road Park and to the Whip.

In sports, we cheered the whole team and our stars, Bob Maresh, Ron Freeman and Larry Fedak in football; Rick Lubinsky in Cross Country; Tom Demo, Dave Brzygot and Art Garik in basketball; Chuck Sanfilippo, Craig Grether, and John Shuleva in Wrestling; Bob Cejer and Ron Linard in Bowling; Denny Zamberlan and Ken Bako in Tennis; Dave Wilson, Jerry Reece and Don Suszko in Track'; and Wally Wytrzes, Loree Soggs and Bill Bauer in Baseball. A walk through the pages of our yearbook will bring back memories of so many other athletes in our class.

School club participants provided service and were given the opportunity to develop leadership skills. Our officers, Chuck Germana, Denny Zamberlan, Kathy Matlock and Janice Rais oversaw senior class events, and our Student City Manager, Jim Noble, led the schools; government. Our class was so very talented, yet we recognized those with noteworthy abilities. We recall Anita Malames as Cleopatra in our Junior Class play, and Sue Kogler and Bob Zadrozny in The Crucible our senior year. The musical talents of Lola Weir, Jane Pilot, Meg Clark and Donna Lucas became a source of school pride. Our cheerleaders, Diane Majher, Maureen Smith, Peggy Murray, Karen Valtman and Bobbi Rice were all wonderfully athletic, sincerely friendly to everyone, down to earth girls who had the skills and zest to lead their classmates. So many leaders we had, it was hard to select the two Top Teens, but we did - Marty Wolf and Sheryl Saunders became Mr. And Miss PSH. Of course we were all "beautiful" (and young), but we knew unusual beauty when we crowned Karen Palumbo our Homecoming Queen, and voted Bob Ondercik the "Most Handsome Male".

Girls'and Boys'Boosters, Canteen Committee, and National Honor Society were popular organizations, which required specific qualifications, but admittance came on the day we were "tapped" in our Junior Year by a departing senior. We became their "little sisters: or "little brothers", and when we became seniors we couldn't wait to "tap" our younger underclass friends. Other clubs-Math, AVA, foreign language and debate all had their share of gifted members. Our marching ban, with drum major, Dave Fiala, led a wonderful group of musicians and Majorettes. The beautiful voices of so many—Ellen Huntington, Noreen Psenicka and Dave Stironek blended so wonderfully in Concert Choir.

As for popular music, of course, the arrival of the Beatles in America in February sent their songs to the top of the charts, yet we still loved the songs of the Four Seasons (Dawn), Martha and the Vandellas (Dancing in the Street), the Beach Boys (Surfer Girl), Lenny Welch (Since I Fell For You), Mary Wells (My Guy), the Animals (House of the rising Sun), The Kingsmen (Louie, Louie), Roy Orbison (Pretty Woman), Bobby Vinton (Mr. Lonely), Betty Everett (The Shoop Shoop Song-It's in his Kiss), Gale Garnette (We'll sing in the Sunshine),-not to forget the folksy music of Peter, Paul and Mary. We jerked, monkied, ponied, slow-danced and sang along with them all.

Romance was always an important part of our teen years. We "necked" and "parked" with our boyfriends and girlfriends. We went "steady" and the boy's class ring or Booster or letter sweater was evidence of the bond. In class we passed notes to friends about our love lives.

Booster sweater, A-line, pleated, and straight skirts (to, or below the knee), with white collared blouses or wool blend sweater were popular. Girls usually set their hair in rollers each night to comb out and tease into a flip or "bubble" the next day. Guys wore button-down collared Oxford shirts or Khaki pants and a buttoned shirt—never jeans or plain t-shirt to school. We wore white socks, nylons, flats, or Spauldings. For Homecoming, we dressed in "semi-formal" attire (suits for guys and short cocktail dresses for girls) as we danced in the decorated cafeteria. It was similar for our Senior Dance (Stairway to the Stars), though the girls; short dresses were a bit more formal. For the Prom we brought out the long gowns and tuxedos. Then we stayed up all nigh and made a weekend affair-first the dance at the Sheraton Cleveland Hotel, then to a major restaurant (maybe Brown Derby or the Theatrical in Cleveland) and afterward bowling until dawn. The next day we picnicked at Whip's Ledges, and at night we partied or met at the drive-in theater.

Whether socializing in school

activities or private groups (the Gents, the Daesons and the Vitas), we congregated with those with mutual interest. With a class of over 700, no "one" person could tell the true high school story each experience. What we discovered 10, 20, and even 30 years later at our 3 reunions is that we had become more alike than different in so many ways.

ACTIVE CLASSES AND LIFE MEMBER-SHIPS

Anyone who have ever graduated from "The Parma Senior High School" no matter which of the 3 PSH schools you attended, is a life member of the Parma Sr High School Alumni Association. Although the Alumni Association. Although the Alumni Assoc was started in 1941, dues were not officially collected until the 1950's. At that time, life membership cards were given to each student at a charge of \$1.00. Currently, students pay a lifetime individual membership dues of \$5.00.

Class dues were first collected, we believe, in the 1950's. At first class dues were collected by the High School Administration and held by PSH for the classes' 1st reunion. When it was found that it was basically illegal for a high school to hold class monies, the PSH Alumni Assoc was asked in 1973 by Arch Brown, Assistant Superintendent, to hold all class funds in for reunions. Your alumni Association received 501C3 non-profit tax- ex-

empt educational/charitable status so it could hold those funds for classes. Today we hold reunion funds for all classes from 1950-2004 except for the classes of 1950 and 1959. These two classes have no funds with us and therefore, are not in active status. Some classes from the 30's and 40's currently have their class funds with the Alumni Association. Because class dues were not collected on a regular basis at that time, these classes are not required to have their class funds with us to be considered an active class. We strongly urge them to keep their money with us for their own protection and IRS purposes.

Active classes are entitled to use the alumni tax-exempt number for reunion related expenses. Typically, a class will save \$800 or more in taxes on the hotel, ballroom and meals for the night. Classes also get updated class lists, mailing labels and reunion information placed in the newsletter and on the web page. Each reunion will receive gifts like sweatshirts, baseball caps, mugs and other items to give away at the reunion. We also provide guided tours of the High School for
