The Parma schools suffered another defeat in November. The already weakened system and their inability to provide a top notch education was no more obvious than at the PSH Alumni Assoc. HOF induction ceremonies Nov. 6th. The inductees raved about the range of courses, the quality of the program, the teachers they had and the advantages they had over other students when they entered college or the work force. In the 50's and 60's, Parma was recognized around the state for innovative courses of study, its outstanding teaching staff, and it's preparation of its graduates to meet the challenges of the day. Even during the tough economic times of the 70's and the technological revolution of the 80's and 90's, Parma continued to offer a wide range of courses and a quality program to its students. The cuts that have been made to the program and the range of course offerings today are a shell of what used to be.

PSH Alumni Hall of Fame for 2009

The PSH Alumni Association inducted eight new members into the Hall of Fame on Friday, November 6, 2009. The induction ceremony was conducted in the high school auditorium in front of an audience comprised of the Senior Class of 2010 and several staff members. The morning program was followed by a breakfast in the Little Theater prepared by Nancy Fedak and a tour of the building led by PSHAA President Tony DeMarco.

This year's slate of inductees included: Sharen Bezik ('65) Sharen was a member of the PSHS debate team that reached the state semi-finals her senior year. That experience provided the foundation for a stellar career as a math teacher and speech/debate coach. In the course of Sharen's distinguished 21 year tenure at Wooster High School she developed a premiere program that brought local and national attention to her program, her students and herself.

Judge Timothy J. Gilligan ('75) Timothy P. Gilligan is the youngest judge ever to be elected to the Parma Municipal Bench. He is noted for his community service and for initiating, supporting, and/or implementing several advances in courtroom procedure to improve efficiency and expediency.

Ronald B. Hutchings ('52) Ronald B. Hutchings joined the Parma Heights Fire Department and served as Fire Chief from 1979 through 1992. Well respected in his field, Chief Hutchings served as secretary of the Northeast Ohio Fire Prevention Society and President of the Northeastern Ohio Fire Chiefs' Association. He was posthumously awarded the title Secretary/Treasurer Emeritis of the Great Lakes Division of the International Association of Fire Chiefs. He initiated a paramedic program and was instrumental in the development of the Southwest Area Hazardous Material Team.

Michael Jaszczak ('80) Michael heads the Art Department at Parma Senior High School and serves in a leadership position with the Parma Education Association. He is an accomplished artist and distinguished yearbook advisor. Michael's students have received local, statewide, and national awards. The 2004 Cinema Yearbook and the "Golden Anniversary" supplemental yearbook produced under his supervision masterfully chronicle the history and the culture of PSH and are truly "books for the ages".

Mickey Vittardi ('78) Mickey actively supports the Parma community as a member of numerous committees and organizations, including

He serves as Commissioner of the Tri-City Youth Football League and Director of the local Punt, Pass, and Kick competition. In 2008 the Parma Elks Lodge 1938 named Mickey Vittardi "Outstanding Citizen of the Year".

John Walter ('65) John was a member of the PSHS debate team that reached the state semi-finals his senior year. He was editor of the Daily Northwestern, the student newspaper of the prestigious Medill Journalism School of Northwestern University. John became a renowned journalist, serving as editor in Ithaca, New York, Washington, and Baltimore before becoming a founding editor of USA Today in 1982. He was managing editor of The Atlanta Journal Constitution from 1989-2002 and opened a custom book publishing company, Vineyard Stories in 2005.

Phyllis Martin Williams ('48) Phyllis Martin Williams earned a PHD in Geography as well as Masters Degrees in Public Health and Epidemiology. She enjoyed a teaching career that spanned the country, including stints at Cuyahoga Community College, Baldwin Wallace, and Kent State. She taught in the Department of Epidemiology and Statistics at Loma Linda University in California and assisted in administering inoculations to native populations in South America. She visited all fifty states and every continent except Australia and Antarctica.

Lauretta Jones ('70) Lauretta is a very accomplished artist. She began her career in graphic design where she was a pioneer in the movement to recognize the potential for the computer as a serious tool in the realm of art. Ms. Jones worked for IBM Research where she was involved in a project for the World's

Fair, Expo '99 in Seville, Spain. Today her art work focuses on botanical subjects; she works primarily in graphite, water color, and colored pencil. Her work is displayed in the Cleveland Botanical Gardens and a number of other distinguished venues. Ms. Jones teaches at the New York Botanical Garden and the Greenwich Art Society.

John Walter Class of 1965 (Deceased 09/19/08)

As a classmate of his, I can attest to the fact that John's potential for greatness was evident throughout his years of schooling at State Road Elementary, Schaaf Junior High School, and Parma Senior High. John's path to success can be tracked all the way back to his early childhood when along with his friend Bob Haas, he generated a newspaper in which he chronicled stories about his family and neighborhood events. The boys pedaled it door to door to friends and neighbors. He excelled in all classes, but displayed a passion for the field of communication. In high school John not only participated in a broad slate of activities, but also assumed a position of leadership in most of them. He served as president of the Audio Visual Club and National Honor Society. He was Editor-in-Chief of the High Spot school newspaper. He was the "Voice of TV station WTIP" on the morning announcements. John was a member of Student Council, Thespians, Spectrum, and Boys Boosters. As a member of the National Forensic League, he participated in his senior year on the state runner-up Parma Senior High School debate team.

John prepared for his career in journalism at the distinguished Medill Journalism School of Northwestern University. In his senior year, John served in the capacity of Editor of the Daily Northwestern Newspaper. Upon graduation from Northwestern in 1969 John set out on the career in journalism he had dreamed of since he was a child.

John Walter's illustrious career began with the Pacific Daily News in Guam. From there he moved on to the Ithaca New York Newspaper, the Washington Star, and the Baltimore News-American. Equipped with the valuable experience garnered at each of those

publications, John ventured into the process of launching a unique approach to presenting the news. In 1982 he became Founding Editor of USA Today. From 1989 to 2002 John was Managing and Executive Editor of the Atlanta Journal Constitution. He was a Pulitzer Prize Juror in 1999-2000.

John's distinguished career evolved from editor to publisher. Following a stint as Editor and Publisher of the Vineyard Gazette from 2003-4, John and his wife Jan Pogue opened a book publishing company, Vineyard Stories, in 2005. Intrigued by the wealth of native material, the company presented a venue for locals to publish local lore by and about the people of Martha's Vineyard. The company published ten books.

John Walter amassed countless awards and recognitions throughout his distinguished career in journalism. Most telling of his accomplishments, however, is the multitude of tributes paid to him by his family and fellow journalists upon the occasion of his untimely death on September 11, 2008. The following are just a sampling of the accolades commemorating John Walter the man:

"John had an immense belief in a journalist's role in the world. He believed in truth, that people have a right to know things," said his wife, Jan Pogue of Edgartown. "He loved journalists. He felt there was duty there. He felt a good journalist could make a difference."

"He was one of the most dynamic editors," said Richard Curtis, managing editor of design at USA Today and another founding editor of the paper. "He was infused with energy. He was dedicated to the paper and his family as well."

"He was a very bright, very aggressive editor and very creative," said Don Boykin, a retired AJC executive who was deputy managing editor under Walter. "He wanted to give readers something beyond the predictable."

Mary Anne Dolan, the former editor of the Los Angeles Herald Examiner said, "I feel I have lost one of the very, very few who truly understand the era of journalism and how hard some of us fought to prevent its end."

His legacy is best stated by a friend who wrote, "John - thank you for all that you gave to this world, you will be remembered and you will be missed." John Walter is indeed an alumnus of whom we should be very proud.

John was married to Jan Pogue for more than two decades and produced their three children — Alexander Pogue, who lives in Boston, Lily Walter, who lives in northern California and Christian Pogue Walter.

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Representing John was his sister, Rosemary.

Lauretta Jones Class of 1970

From Lauretta Jones Class of 1970

After graduation from PHS in 1970, I went to Cleveland Institute of Art. I totally credit the art faculty as PHS, including William Harper, Tony DeMarco and Mr. Rewalt for preparing me to get accepted at CIA. Especially important was the support we had in crafting our portfolios and in entering the Scholastic Art Awards, introducing us as gently as possible to the notion of competition in art. In fact, I still have a book of linoleum cuts that received a Gold Key and were sent to New York as a finalist. I'd also like to say how vital Robert Backston was in my life as an artist. He was my art teacher in 7th and 9th grade at Schaaf Junior High School and when I complained to him that my parents wanted me to go to college, he told me about CIA. I didn't even know there was such a thing as an art college, and that conversation truly changed my life.

At CIA, I majored in Graphic Design not because I loved it, but because I knew I had to support myself. While in college, I created illustrations for a Case Western Reserve newsletter, the Museum of Natural History and Stouffer's. After graduation in 1975, I became an art director at a printing firm. What I really loved, however, was crafts, and I had a number of works accepted into the May Show at the Cleveland Museum of Art, including an embroidered soft sculptured aerial map of the Cuyahoga Valley. It won honorable mention and was the first work I sold.

In 1979, I moved to Manhattan. I worked at a small ad agency before buying an Apple II computer in 1981 and starting on a new path as a freelance illustrator. My clients included many computer magazines and educational companies such as Scholastic. I even did a project for MAD Magazine, my childhood favorite! It was exciting being one of the few artists pioneering the use of the computer as a serious tool. I was interviewed by magazines and local cable television as well as by the BBC. My fellow computer artists and I were certain that computer art tools would develop as they have, but in the early days we faced a lot of skepticism and even ridicule. Speaking in public to artists led me to teaching at the School of Visual Arts (SVA) and eventually to becoming the director of the Computer Art Department at SVA in 1988.

At about the same time, I designed the interfaces for two interactive computer systems

commissioned by IBM for a show at their Gallery of Science and Art. This led me to join IBM Research in 1990 to work on a project for the world's fair, EXPO'92 in Seville, Spain. My colleagues and I created a huge and groundbreaking touch-screen system for which we won several awards.

I was the first graphic designer/artist to join IBM Research and I helped the scientists explore the importance of visual design on the usability of computer interfaces. I also got to meet other high-profile designers, including the legendary Paul Rand. After a while, I became a manager and led a number of projects including my favorite, an educational computer system with the Museum of Modern Art.

I moved to a part-time schedule at IBM and began painting and drawing my favorite things—plants—with good old graphite, colored pencil and nice, slow watercolor. As you know, one cannot rush watercolor, and so I began to reconnect with the rhythms of the natural world.

I have been teaching botanical art at the New York Botanical Garden (NYBG) since 2000. My botanical art has been accepted into many group shows, I have had a few solo shows, and am represented in the prestigious collection of the Hunt Institute of Botanical Documentation at Carnegie Mellon. Last year, I took an early retirement from IBM. Since then, I have been very busy teaching at NYBG, the Greenwich Art Society, and in my studio; working in my garden; volunteering for my local land trust, and serving on my town's open space committee. I help in the stewardship of the new 645-acre Angle Fly Preserve in Somers, NY, where we have uncovered the remains of a 1920's walled garden that I hope to restore. I look forward to taking some of my students out of the classroom and into the field and forest and spending more time on my own work. The pressure to work commercially is off at last, and so for the first time since school, I will let my art explorations take me wherever they lead.

Judge Timothy P. Gilligan (Class of 1975)

After graduating from Parma Senior High School in 1975 Timothy Gilligan earned an Associate of Arts degree in Law Enforcement and a Bachelor of Science degree in Communication from Ohio University. He went on to earn a Juris Doctor degree from Cleveland State's Cleveland-Marshall College of Law. He began his law career in Middleburgh Heights, engaged in the practice of general law with the firm of Forth, Kelly, Urban and West in 1987.

From January 1989 through November, 1993 Mr. Gilligan worked as an assistant prosecuting attorney, prosecuting defendants charged with criminal felony offenses under the auspices of the Office of the Prosecuting Attorney, Medina County. In November, 1996 Mr. Gilligan became, at the age of thirty-six, the youngest judge ever to be elected to the Parma Municipal Court Bench. Moreover, Judge Timothy Gilligan has the distinction of being the only graduate of Parma High School to serve as a Judge of Parma Court.

Outside the courtroom, Judge Gilligan plays an active role in support of the Parma Community. He is held in high regard not only for his sharp legal mind, but for his heart as well. Just a few years ago, Judge Gilligan was the driving force behind what was perhaps the largest fund raising event in the history of Parma. The large-scale event, which took place at Byers Field, was organized to generate financial support for the sixteen-year-old son of a friend who suffered a severe neck injury. Every penny raised at the event went directly to the quadriplegic young man.

Judge Gilligan, is credited for initiating, supporting, and/or implementing several advances in courtroom procedure to improve efficiency and expediency. Judge Gilligan helped facilitate the computerization of court documents and records. He also supported video arraignment of prisoners, thereby freeing police officers from the responsibility of escorting prisoners from jail to court. This allows police officers to utilize their time more productively, patrolling the streets of Parma. Recently Judge Gilligan helped introduce the new Secure Continuous Remote Alcohol Monitoring system (SCRAM for short) to the Parma Municipal Court. This new technology involves placing an ankle bracelet on persons convicted of drunk driving who are ordered by the court to refrain from alcohol consumption. The device detects the presence of alcohol in perspiration and transmits that information to the court. Utilized in lieu of jail time, the system saves the court thousands of taxpayer dollars while granting offenders the opportunity to address their drinking issues outside of jail. The cost of housing prisoners is eliminated and the prisoners pay for the anklet.

The Parma Sun Post writes, "Judge Gilligan is so full of energy he can barely keep up with himself." The Cleveland Plain Dealer states that, "After almost sixteen years on the bench, Gilligan is known as a tough, creative judge." They go on to say, "In dealing with child abuse, domestic violence, or repeat drunken driving offenders, Gilligan is never shy about expressing outrage."
